
The 4 S's of Good Writing

- 1. Specific
- 2. Strong Verbs (ventured, veered, dashed, bolted)
- 3. Sensory Details (taste, smell, sound, touch, see)
- 4. Show vs. Tell (don't use the words 'was' of 'is')
- 5. If its not one of the above skip it!


How to story plan

- work scene by scene don't jump ahead or you'll miss the important details!
- Words are the most important thing in story writing
- If words aren't able to create an image in the mind of the read-skip it!
- Each scene needs its own mind map

Example: Scene 1 of your story is entering the cave of a dragon



Story writing should take on this appearance: think of this line like your main characters blood pressure!



Setting Background Info

Planning Order:

- 1) **Problem -** when your character first feels stressed (only ONE!)
 - a. Character vs. character
 - b. Character vs. nature (natural disaster)
 - c. Character vs. self (internal struggles)
 - d. Character vs. society (corporations, large groups of people)
 - e. Character vs. supernatural (these are normally longer because you have to explain more)
- 2) **Solution –** when your character becomes unstressed
 - a. Never kill off your main character! If you HAVE to kill a character, kill off another character it is unsatisfying to your reading
 - b. Never use 'waking up from a dream to end your story!
- 3) **Middle** the most exciting part!
 - a. Try and fail model until problem is solved
 - b. Gets worse and worse then better
 - c. Two attempts at the problem before the character is able to solve the problem (the 3rd attempt is the hardest to come up with!)
- 4) **Background information** often very important in strengthening the ability to solve the problem
- 5) **End** character should reflect on a feeling
 - a. Past
 - b. Present
 - c. Future
- 6) **Beginning** what is your character doing 5 minutes before the problem starts

- *Main character needs to remain likeable
- **Attempts to solve the problem must be believable and not too easy
 ***Make sure you write scenes not summaries!
